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

Wednesday 14 June – Talk by Dan Baschier on the Search for Ludwig Leichhardt's Path 1845 Northern Territory Library at 5.15pm



In 2008, Dan and his wife Annie Whybourne discovered a tree in Kakadu National Park which they believe was marked by the explorer Leichhardt in 1845. This discovery led Dan to begin untangling a complex web of historical distortions aimed at discrediting Leichhardt. Leichhardt and his party mysteriously disappeared and this discovery could help to find out what may have happened to him.


## Thursday 15 June – TROVE - at Northern Territory Library – 8.30am-11.30am


# Wednesday 28 June, Chief Minister's NT History Book Awards - at the NT Library – 12 noon – 1pm

# 28–30 July - Field Trip – Murranji Track – A Brief Journey Along the Buchanan Highway By Earl James

This year's field trip during the Darwin Show weekend will be a journey to look at heritage-listed sites along the old Murranji Track and a few that are not heritage listed. This will be achieved by a leisurely journey along the Buchanan Highway from the Stuart Highway to Top Springs (180kms) with short trips to left and right to each of the places of interest along the way.

It will also include a trip to the remains of the Old Top Springs to see what remains there.

You may recall in last month's newsletter my story about the Murranji stock route and what my son Matthew and I found along the track. On the track we will see Scobies Rockhole (an old aboriginal well); White's grave on the Buntine Highway; and search for marked trees at the Murranji Waterhole.

This trip does not require a 4x4 vehicle but it does require a vehicle

with reasonably high clearance. The Buchanan is not bitumised and is not particularly rough at the moment but by the time of

our field-trip it could be corrugated. Also, some of the side trips are a little rough but all are manageable without a 4 wheel drive, AND, if you don't want to tough it at night, you can get a room at Dunmarra on the first day (Friday Show Day) and accommodation at Top Springs on the second & last day (Saturday).



The itinerary is as follows:

**Friday 28 July** – Travel down the Stuart Highway to Dunmarra Roadhouse (640 kms). Spend the night at Dunmarra camping area. If you prefer a cabin at Dunmarra Roadhouse, book now.

**Saturday 29 July** – All meet at the turnoff to Top Springs 10km north of Dunmarra at 8.00am. Drive along the Buchannan Highway looking at places of historic and heritage interest. Spend the night at the Top Springs camp ground (though some hardies may want to camp on the Illawarra Creek). If you prefer a cabin at Top Springs book now.

**Sunday 30 July** – Drive to the site of the Old Top Springs. Return home (600 kms).

### Letter from the Editor of the Journal - Clayton Fredericksen

I have received much positive feedback on articles and short reports published in recent issues of *Northern Territory Historical Studies*. I would like to thank all those authors who have made the journal such a success. The first issue was published nearly 30 years ago(!) and I hope it will continue for at least another 30. Keep those contributions rolling in.

I am especially keen to receive offers of articles on themes relating to central Australia and on Aboriginal history and heritage. These areas have been underrepresented in the journal. The history, heritage and archaeology of the Northern Territory is not limited to white settlement of the north. There are many stories to tell from the centre and from the perspective of Aboriginal history, including the time before the establishment of white settlements. Please contact me if you have any ideas for stories or research you might like to share.

In the editorial to the 2017 issue I observed that all authors in that issue held post-graduate qualifications in history or a related field. This has since been commented on by others. There is a simple explanation for this. Over the past two years most offers of articles have come from academics and other professional historians. Too few have landed in my email in-box from general members of the HSNT, who after all are the backbone of the Society, or from other 'avocational' researchers. Yet I know from talking with people in Darwin (and I'm sure this also holds for Alice Springs and elsewhere) there are fascinating life stories and personal research projects that have yet to be written down. The tragedy is that many of these stories will ultimately be lost. I am not worried if someone offers an article that contains less than perfect spelling and grammar. The point of the journal is to share stories of the Northern Territory, not to publish textbook perfect articles solely for an academic audience. So my plea to you is to contact me if you have a paper, or even an idea for a paper, that you would like to see in print and recorded for the benefit of future generations of Territorians.


